In this quick guide you will find all the practical and operational details you need to know to participate in the event.

1. What is a YUFETHON?

It is an online event where participants will meet for two days (20h) to work intensively on a solution to a specific problem. Participants will work in small groups in a unique environment that encourages creative thinking and will result in new concepts and innovative ideas.

2. Objective of the YUFETHON

The aim of YUFETHON is to promote and encourage innovation, talent and the development of new ideas that add value to society. During the YUFETHON, we aim to create an ecosystem of creativity and inspiration between students and the YUFE community, where knowledge and experiences can be shared.

3. What are the issues and problems to be solved?

Challenge 1: Social responsability

Lines:

1) Social participation in the community

What formulas or initiatives could enhance the participation of young people in the collective affairs that affect their lives?

2) <u>Refugees</u>

How can we effectively integrate refugees into our communities? Target groups: Option 1: War refugees Option 2: Economic refugees Option 3: Political refugees

3) <u>Negative feedback in social communication and decision making.</u>

How can the effect between negative comments found in communication on people's decision making be neutralised? and, what actions can be taken at the municipal level to promote objective communication?

Please choose a line (1, 2, 3) and consider the questions as example on how to address the challenge.

If your choice is 2, please also choose a target group.



Challenge 2: Education

Lines:

1) Early school leavers

What changes could be introduced to link students to education and avoid early school leaving? (early school leaving is understood as not completing secondary/compulsory education)

2) The integration of international students

What the community could offer to the international students to integrate them in the local society? And, How could the community benefit from the international students?

3) The university of the future.

What does the university of the future have to offer in order to be perceived as an element of value?

Please choose a line (1, 2, 3) and consider the questions as example on how to address the challenge.

Challenge 3: Loneliness and mental health problems

Lines:

Young people
Elderly

Questions:

1) What kind of ideas, proposals and methods could be considered to face loneliness and mental health problems?

2) How technology could help to improve the problem?

Please choose one line (1,2) and consider the questions as example on how to address the challenge.

Challenge 4: Mobility

Line:

1) Bikes and skates

Questions:

a) How could local government help to solve the problem being created by the massive use of bicycles and scooters in many European cities? e.g. hinder traffic, many bikes and skates are lying on the street etc.

b) How could we use technology to solve this problem?

Please consider the questions as example on how to address the challenge.



Challenge 5: Housing

Lines:

1) Housing shortage among young people in the cities

What kind of measures could help young people to gain access to housing? e.g. many young people cannot afford the loan/rent for a flat, cannot afford a suitable place to live, so they are moving out of the city.

Measures: Option 1: Legal issues Option 2: Transportation issues Option 3: Economic issues Option 4: Urban issues Option 5: Social need

2) Build houses from a sustainable perspective

What kind of ideas and proposals could be considered to build ecologically and socially affordable housing?

Elements:

Option 1: Energy and efficiency

Option 2: Water efficiency

Option 2: Internet of the things (IoTs)

Option 3: Smart houses for health care

Please choose one line (1,2) and consider the questions as example on how to address the challenge.

If your choice is 1, please also choose at least one measure. If your choice is 2, please also choose at least one element

4. Team building

Teams will be created by the participants themselves on the starting day of the event and will be composed of 5 to 6 participants. Teams must meet the following requirements:

- At least 3 universities represented (if possible)
- At least 3 different fields of study or degrees (if possible)
- Gender diversity teams (if possible and balanced)

8. Team evaluation

Teams will present their project to the jury in the form of a 20-minute pitch followed by a 10minute question and answer session. Teams are free to choose the format in which to present their project or idea.

The projects will be evaluated by the committee according to the following criteria:

- Project design and final solution: learning process, novelty of the idea and degree of development
- Communication and presentation skills
- Team criteria requirements and Team work: extent of collaboration, involvement of team members



9. Evaluation committee

The evaluation committee will be chosen by the YUFETHON organiser and will include representatives of the YUFE ecosystem (i.e. municipalities, students, staff, citizens). The committee will assess the projects according to the established criteria. At the end of all the presentations, the committee members will discuss on the final scores of the teams. In the case that from an organisational point of view two or more evaluation committees will run in parallel with different sets of teams, then the finalist of each set will go on to a second round. The presentation in this case will be cut-down to half the time of the previous round.

10. Selection of the best proposal

The proposal selected by the evaluation committee will be announced the same day by the organisers. The team with the best score will be awarded with a winning certificate.

11. Awards and recognitions

All participants will receive a letter of attendance in the YUFETHON.

12. Language

English is the main language of the YUFETHON.
